

Hays Count Child Protective Board Funding Allocation Guidelines

These guidelines are to be used as a reference. The board will consider and fund each individual request based on the needs and circumstance of the children, on the financial status of the board and on the availability of alternative funding sources.

Guidelines should be reviewed on a regular basis (minimum annually) and adjusted as appropriate.

Initial Clothing Allowance

- \$100 for ages 0 to 5
- \$150 for ages 6 to 12
- \$200 for ages 13 and older

Birthday Gifts

- \$30 for ages 0 to 12
- \$40 for ages 13 and older

Christmas Gifts

- \$30 for ages 0 to 2
- \$35 for age 3
- \$45 for ages 4 to 6
- \$55 for ages 7 to 9
- \$70 for ages 10 to 12
- \$85 for ages 13 and older

Back to School Allowance

- \$75 for Ages 4 (head start), 5, 6, and 7
- \$100 for Ages 8, 9, and 10
- \$125 for Ages 11, 12, and 13
- \$150 for Ages 14 and older

If the board is not able to fully fund the Back to School request, the allocation amounts will reduced for all age groups by a percentage. The final allocation level (100%, 90%, 80%, etc.) should be determined after receipt of a list of the children and their ages.

Court Ordered Drug Tests

• \$6,000 annually

Routine Request

Routine requests are a reoccurring item on the monthly meeting agenda.

- · Submit completed Request Form
 - o Responsible: CPS
- · Approve or deny request
 - o Responsible: Board
- Deliver gift cards and checks to CPS
 - o Responsible: Treasurer
- Submit receipts for expenditures to treasurer
 - Responsible: CPS

Birthday Gifts

Birthday gift requests are a reoccurring item on the monthly meeting agenda. The allocation of funds, \$30 for 12 and under, \$40 for over 12, for birthday gift cards has been approved by the board. This item does not require board approval; it is a review process.

- · Provide list of children and birthdates for succeeding month
 - o Responsible: CPS
- Report of gift cards distributed for current month, unused gift cards returned to treasurer
 - o Responsible: CPS
- · Deliver birthday gift cards to CPS
 - o Responsible: Treasurer
- · Submit birthday gift card receipts
 - o Responsible: CPS

Drug Test

Review of drug test invoices is a reoccurring item on the monthly meeting agenda. The allocation of funds for drug testing, \$6,000 per year, has been approved by the board. This item does not require board approval; it is a review process.

- · Provide invoice copies
 - o Responsible: Treasurer
- · Periodic review and verify invoices
 - Responsible: Treasurer & CPS
- Disburse payment to lab
 - o Responsible: Treasurer

Holiday Gifts

Holiday gifts are an item on the November through March monthly agendas.

- November
 - Approve funding levels
 - Responsible: Board
 - Submit list of children (first names), ages, foster parent, and case worker (prefer an electronic copy) to Treasurer
 - Responsible: CPS

Hay County Child Protective Board Request Process

- · December
 - Deliver gift cards to CPS
 - Responsible: Treasurer
- January
 - o Report on number of gift cards (by denomination) distributed
 - Responsible: CPS
 - o Return checks and gift cards that were not distributed
 - Responsible: CPS
- · January March
 - Submit Holiday receipts
 - Responsible: CPS

Back to School Allowance (for all children, regardless of placement)

If the board is not able to fully fund the Back to School request, the allocation amounts will reduced for all age groups by a percentage. The final allocation level (100%, 90%, 80%, etc.) should be determined after receipt of a list of the children and their ages.

- · July
 - Prepare a single request form and attach a list (spreadsheet) of children with their birthdates and caseworkers (similar to the Christmas list).
 - Responsible: CPS
 - This list should be provided electronically to the treasurer.
 - Responsible: CPS
 - Special needs for back to school should be submitted on separate request forms.
 - Responsible: CPS
 - Approve funding level and special needs request
 - Responsible: Board
- · August 1
 - Deliver gift cards to CPS
 - Responsible: Treasurer
- · September October
 - Return checks and gift cards that were not distributed
 - Responsible: CPS
 - Submit receipt
 - Responsible: CPS

Emergency Requests

Emergency requests are made outside of the regular monthly meetings. Typically, the approval timeline does not allow for the request to be held until the next regularly scheduled meeting.

- · Submit completed Request Form via email to Secretary and Treasurer
 - o Responsible: CPS
- · Send request to board members via email
 - o Responsible: Secretary

Hay County Child Protective Board Request Process

- · Utilize email for communication and approval or denial
 - o Responsible: Board
- · Deliver gift card or check to CPS
 - o Responsible: Treasurer
- Submit receipt for expenditure
 - o Responsible: CPS

All gift cards and checks distributed require a receipt for the resulting expenditure. The Hays County Child Protective Board receives funding from Hays County. The board is able to access these funds only through the submission of valid receipts.
