HCLHD to hold Emergency Preparedness event

Barnabas Connection will host the Hays County Local Health Department (HCLHD) to discuss how to prepare for when disaster strikes.

The Hays County Local Health Department (HCLHD) will hold the next part of their Healthy Hays Discussion Series on Sept. 19.

"We've experienced multiple floods and freezes in recent years, which underscores the importance of being vigilant and well-prepared for such events," said Hays County Local Health Department Manager Matthew Gonzales.

The presentation will be given in English from 6:15 p.m. to 6:45 p.m and in Spanish from 7:00 p.m. to 7:45 p.m. Snacks and drinks will be available for attendees.



IMMTRAC2

Texas Immunization Registry, which is commonly referred to as IMMTRAC (ImmTrac2) is a secure and confidential database that stores immunization information for residents of Texas. It is a program managed by the Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS).

The main purpose of ImmTrac2 is to maintain electronic records of immunizations given to individuals, both children and adults, in the state of Texas. Healthcare providers, such as doctors, nurses, and clinics, use ImmTrac2 to input and access immunization records for their patients. This system helps ensure that individuals receive the appropriate vaccinations and that their vaccination history is readily available to authorized healthcare providers.



Texas Immunization Registry (ImmTrac2) Adult Consent Form



Did you know that in 2005, House Bill 1921 required that all healthcare providers and payors must report to ImmTrac2 all vaccines given to children under 18 years old? Parents can grant consent to participate in the registry or can request exclusion from the registry. You can provide your immunization records to the local health department or to ImmTrac2 to have your records permanently recorded in the system.

Did you know that your COVID-19 vaccines are "disaster-consented"? The state must keep disaster related vaccine records for 5 years. After 5 years these records are purged from the system. That means if you do not consent into ImmTrac2, your records could be lost. To consent to have your or your children's vaccines in the system, you can use the applications attached and send them by mail to the local health department at 101 Thermon Drive, San Marcos, Texas 78666.

IMMTRAC2

Immunization registries, such as the Texas Immunization Registry (IMMTRAC2), serve several important purposes in public health and healthcare management:

- Accurate Record Keeping:

 Immunization registries help maintain accurate and up-to-date records of individuals' vaccination histories. This ensures that healthcare providers have access to reliable information about a patient's immunization status.
- Vaccine Management: Registries
 assist healthcare providers in
 managing vaccine inventories and
 scheduling immunization
 appointments. This helps reduce
 vaccine wastage and ensures that
 vaccines are available when
 needed.
- Health Surveillance: Public **Immunization** registries play a crucial public health role in surveillance. By tracking immunization rates at the community and population levels, health authorities can identify areas with low vaccination rates or of underimmunized pockets individuals. This information essential for developing targeted interventions to prevent disease outbreaks.

- Outbreak Response: During disease outbreaks, registries can quickly identify individuals who are susceptible to the disease and may need immediate vaccination or other preventive measures. This helps contain outbreaks and prevent their spread.
- Reducing **Duplication** Errors: Electronic registries can reduce duplication of vaccines in immunization and errors records. Thev help prevent unnecessary revaccination ensure that individuals receive the appropriate vaccines according to their and age medical history.
- Emergency Preparedness:
 Registries are valuable tools for emergency preparedness and response. During public health emergencies, such as pandemics or bioterrorism threats, they can help authorities quickly identify and reach out to individuals who may need specific vaccines or medical interventions.

COVID CORNER

COVID-19 Update

COVID-19 continues to be disruptive in Hays County and across the United States. We are currently seeing very high levels of COVID in the community.

What you can do to protect yourself from COVID-19:

- Wear a high-quality mask (N95, KN95 or KF94) in crowded indoor settings, especially in healthcare facilities and around vulnerable populations.
- Stay home if you are sick. Do not rush to end your isolation if you have COVID. Early evidence suggests that getting plenty of rest while sick is the best way to minimize your chances of long-term effects from a COVID infection.
- COVID is spread primarily through the air. To reduce your chances of exposure, improve indoor air quality through ventilation (open windows) and filtration (HEPA filters or a Corsi-Rosenthal box).
- Practice overall good health habits—wash your hands, exercise, eat healthy foods, and get adequate rest. These practices all strengthen your immune system and lower your chances of getting sick.



COVID-19 Update



Graph & Data Explanation

Official Cases: this data represents the number of cases that are reported to the health department from medical facilities. Because many people do not visit a medical facility for diagnosis, we know that this number is an undercount of true case prevalence.

Unofficial Cases: this data is comprised of the official case numbers, in addition to self-reported home tests and reports from a variety of local facilities such as daycares, schools, residential living facilities, and others.

Influenza-like Illness: this data is collected from numerous sources and is comprised of positive flu cases as well as influenza-like illness that may not have a positive test for flu. This category may be inadvertently catching undiagnosed COVID cases in addition to influenza cases.

EPI INSIGHTS

Rabies

Rabies is a viral disease that is virtually 100% fatal once symptoms appear. It can be prevented by a safe and effective vaccine. Rabies can be spread to people if they are scratched or bitten by an infected animal. In Hays County, rabies is most often found in foxes and bats. Other rabies carriers in Texas include skunks, racoons, dogs, and cats.

Rabies is spread through the saliva of an infected animal when the animal bites another animal or person. Rabies can also be spread through non-bite exposures, such as scratches or open wounds that are exposed to saliva from a rabid animal—although this mode of transmission is extremely rare. Infected animals can only transmit rabies when they are symptomatic. Any animal infected will die 7 to 10 days after the initial symptoms of rabies begins.

Initial signs of rabies in animals may include fearfulness, restlessness, changes in appetite, vomiting, diarrhea, enlargement of the pupils, hypersensitivity to light and sound, and excessive salivation. Animals often have behavioral changes and may become unusually aggressive. Nocturnal animals may appear in the daytime.

If you are bitten or scratched, or have an open wound that saliva could enter, by an unvaccinated animal:

- Thoroughly wash the wound with soap and water for at least 15 minutes.
- Contact your healthcare provider as soon as possible to assess your risk of rabies and other infections.
- You may need to get a vaccine to prevent rabies.

EPI INSIGHTS

Rabies Vaccination in Hays County

If you need a rabies vaccine after a potential exposure, you will need to go to one of the 3 hospital emergency rooms in Hays County (Christus in San Marcos, Seton in Kyle, or BSW in Buda). In Hays County, emergency rooms are the only places that have the appropriate postexposure prophylaxis (PEP). Following an exposure, you will need a dose of human rabies immune globulin (HRIG) and the four-dose series of the rabies vaccine. The rabies vaccine is given on the day of exposure (or as soon as possible), and days 3, 7, and 14.

Pre-exposure prophylaxis (PrEP) is recommended for people in certain high-risk occupations (such as veterinarians and animal control officers). PrEP is a two-dose series. Hays County Health Department does not currently provide the rabies vaccine. At this time, the San Marcos Walgreens (639 Hopkins St., San Marcos) is the only pharmacy to regularly carry the rabies vaccine. Call ahead for an appointment.
